In the movie *Hotel Rwanda* Paul Rusesabagina (main character), is the manager of a European-owned hotel in Rwanda, who creates a secret refugee camp for the Tutsi people during the brutal genocide committed against them by the Hutu people in 1994. His efforts helped to save 1200 lives out of close to a million who were killed. In this movie you encountered some very harsh realities of injustice – but also so very heroic examples of people standing up for their beliefs and values in the dignity and sanctity of human life.
